Liturgical Jottings

1 Thessalonians

These last weeks of the Liturgical Year we read from St Paul's first Letter to the Church at Thessalonica which is in modern day Greece. It is the first letter Paul wrote, in fact it is the earliest book of the New Testament, predating the Gospels. It is written about 50-51 AD. It is like a letter home to a friend. Paul started with a greeting to the people: "Grace to you and Peace", and related his travels with Timothy, particularly on their gives ministry together. He encouragement to them and hopes to see them again. His letter finishes with a farewell salutation and the blessing: "the Grace of our Lord Jesus Christ be with you (Amen).

Looking at the Readings

Chapter 22 of the Gospel according to St Matthew presents four big questions: about paying Taxes (last week), about the resurrection of the dead (omitted this year), what is the greatest commandment (this week) and about the Son of David (not included in the lectionaries). Asking questions is a legitimate line of enquiring and learning. But we know all too well about the person who asks too many questions! The question put today is recorded in all three of the synoptic Gospels, but in different contexts. In Matthew the question is to test Jesus, in Luke (10:25-28) also a test but in the context of what must I do to inherit eternal life, followed by a second question: "Who is my neighbour?" in Mark (12:28-34) the scribe who asked the question was praised by Jesus.

The context in Matthew's gospel today reflected the concerns of the Christians to whom Matthew was writing and with whom he was living. They were emerging from Judaic practices and forming a new ecclesial community. Law and Commandments were important legacies from their tradition, also were integrity and faithfulness to the Word and right living and sincerity in action. Matthew's "Last Judgement" (25:31-46) serves as a great witness for this very concern.

The "Greatest Commandment" to love God and neighbour avoids the legalism of the past and offers a deeper relationship with Father, Son, Holy Spirit and all humanity. Like the question about paying the Roman tax, Jesus' answers are not compromises but a new and exciting way of being Christian.

All Saints' Day

Next Sunday is the Solemnity of All Saints, the feast will displace the Liturgy of the 31st Sunday in Ordinary Time. We acknowledge the countless people who have died and entered eternal life that are saints but not formally recognised and placed in the Calendar of Saints. They now pray for us. The day is followed by All Souls Day commemorating those who have died and awaiting entry into heaven. We pray for them.

Seeing photos with large crowds of people sitting or standing close to one another feels contrary to all the reflexes that we have learned over these past months. ...

I've been very encouraged by the regular feedback from parishioners assuring me that, though I might not have had the opportunity to visit the diocese over these months, they've become very familiar with me through participating from home in the St Kilian's Sunday Mass. ...

I'm certainly feeling at home in the diocese now, and increasingly at home in the ministry of bishop, too. I'm very grateful for the warm welcome and support that so many people have extended to me over this year. I've got used to talking about 'us' when I'm referring to Sandhurst, but I'll know that I've really become a local when I no longer need to rely on the GPS to navigate around Bendigo!


