Installing lights on tractors, explained a farmer's wife, was the worse innovation for agricultural life. No longer did the farmer, grazier, harvester, come home at sunset for dinner. Before Christ to the latter part of the twentieth century outdoor work, especially farming, was done in daylight. Nefarious activities were confined to night-time. Hence the situation in today's Gospel: The fisherman caught nothing all night. Now in the daytime they had a marvellous haul of fish.

The double lesson did not escape Peter. The dawn of new light gave deeper insight to his life and the miraculous catch, far beyond the natural order, revealed Christ as a great and holy person. Like Peter, the disciple is invited to recognise Jesus in their life, and leave everything to follow him. We do so in a Christian way. We retain balance in life, with work and family and give priority to God and his Word that gives true life.

Word of God Sunday

In September 2019, Pope Francis instituted Sunday of the Word of God encouraging the celebration, study and dissemination of the Word of God. While most countries celebrate the day on the Third Sunday in Ordinary Time, the Church in Australia celebrates it on the first Sunday in February each year since 2020.

The first Eucharistic Prayer of Masses for Various Needs would be particularly appropriate. It acknowledges the Word of Christ's Gospel calling us to unity across every people, tongue and nation, and asks that the Church be renewed by the light of the Gospel.

Other suggestions to celebrate, study and disseminate include: Procession and Enthronement of the Book of the Gospels, Brief Homily on the beauty of the Word in our daily lives. Scripturally based Prayers. Commissioning Readers. Bible Study groups, Gifts of the Bible or just a copy Mark's Gospel for this year.

World Day of Prayer for the Sick

This day is celebrated on the memorial of Our Lady of Lourdes, Friday 11 February, around the world. "A society is all the more human to the degree that it cares effectively for its most frail and suffering members, in a spirit of fraternal love. 


Liturgical Jottings Seraphim

The Prophet Isaiah introduces the angelic order of seraph to Judaism, Christianity and Islam. "Seraphim" means "those who are on fire. Today's first reading we learn that the Seraphim or seraphs give praise and glory to God in Heaven. Likewise angels in the Responsorial Psalm (137:1) accompany the psalmist to sing praise. In both testaments the Angels are depicted defenders and messengers, of God's generally agents providence.

Seraphim also feature in our liturgy in four of the Roman Prefaces. In the Franciscan Missal St Francis is called the Seraphic Father and St Bonaventure the Seraphic Doctor. The Franciscans are called the Seraphic order.

COPING WITH COVID

Although we are in a new year, and hopefully lockdowns are a thing of the past, particularly for our school community, following is a reflection on how our teachers dealt with lockdowns last year.

"Professionally: lockdown was good opportunity to learn new ways of teaching and engaging students. I felt that it was tough, as the "nice" moments you experience face to face were not felt. I felt helpless when kids didn't understand/ turn up or were disengaged. I coped by trying to learn new skills in the way I taught etc, maintaining a routine and spending time with kids with a balance between teaching and having fun through Kahoot!, games and chatting. Personally: I went through stages where being really fine with being in lockdown. I set daily tasks that I had to complete which varied in complexity from folding washing to sanding and varnishing skirting boards. The routine of school life and meetings kept my mind busy. I also went through stages were I was not ok with lockdown. At these times I spent time with my family or - totally withdrew and just watched mindless TV shows. I coped by setting daily goals for days I was doing well and giving myself a break when I wasn't."



Lk 5:1-11

They left everything and followed him

Jesus was standing one day by the Lake of Gennesaret, with the crowd pressing round him listening to the word of God, when he caught sight of two boats close to the bank. The fishermen had gone out of them and were washing their nets. He got into one of the boats – it was Simon's – and asked him to put out a little from the shore. Then he sat down and taught the crowds from the boat.

When he had finished speaking he said to Simon, 'Put out into deep water and pay out your nets for a catch.' 'Master,' Simon replied, 'we worked hard all night long and caught nothing, but if you say so, I will pay out the nets.' And when they had done this they netted such a huge number of fish that their nets began to tear, so they signalled to their companions in the other boats to come and help them; when these came, they filled the two boats to sinking point.

When Simon Peter saw this he fell at the knees of Jesus saying, 'Leave me, Lord; I am a sinful man.' For he and all his companions were completely overcome by the catch they had made; so also were James and John, sons of Zebedee, who were Simon's partners. But Jesus said to Simon, 'Do not be afraid; from now on it is men you will catch.' Then, bringing their boats back to land, they left everything and followed him.

A reading from the prophet Isaiah

Here am I! Send me.

In the year of King Uzziah's death I saw the Lord seated on a high throne; his train filled the sanctuary; above him stood seraphs, each one with six wings.

And they cried out one to another in this way, 'Holy, holy, holy is the Lord of hosts. His glory fills the whole earth.'

A reading from the first letter of St Paul to the Corinthians

In the first place, I taught you what I had been taught myself, namely that Christ died for our sins, in accordance with the scriptures; that he was buried; and that he was raised to life on the third day, in accordance with the scriptures; that he appeared first to Cephas and secondly to the Twelve. Next he appeared to more than five hundred of the brothers at the same time, most of whom are still alive, though some have died; then he appeared to James, and then to all the apostles; and last of all he appeared to me too; it was as though I was born when no one expected it.

But what matters is that I preach what they preach, and this is what you all believed.
