Doxology

The concluding doxology is:

"Through him, and with him, and in him, O God, almighty Father, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all glory and honour is yours, for ever and ever. Amen."

by which the glorification of God is expressed and which is affirmed and concluded by the people's acclamation Amen. GIRM 79h.

The word "Doxology" is formed from two Greek words: DOXA which means opinion or glory and OLOGY which means word, discourse or study. As a liturgical word, Doxology has acquired the sense of a hymn of glory to God.

It is a brief prayer of praise which emphasises the Lord Jesus role as mediator in the context of the Trinity, thus turning the prayer into the praise and glory of God.

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Looking at the Readings

The first reading from Isaiah may be inaccurately reduced to subduing the power of rulers of nations. Likewise the Gospel reduced to the issue of paying/avoiding taxes. But taking a synoptic view of the Old Testament reading and the Gospel together it is more than power and taxes. Rather it prompts us to find the right relationships between earthly authority and God's authority and will. Firstly God has called his people by their name, He has established and maintained a relationship of protection, compassion and justice.

Having that right relationship with God we give to God what is God's: praise and thanksgiving, worship and love, peace and justice, service to others and finally true happiness. Jesus neither advocates compromise or a sort of dichotomy between state and church authorities. The separation of powers, whether imposed, negotiated or presumed cannot be autonomous or absolute, or simply public and private There is an interdependence. Each has responsibilities towards the good of the people and the care of creation.

"In the same way as Caesar looks for his image on a coin, God looks for his in your soul. "Give back to Caesar what is Caesar's," the Saviour says. What does Caesar demand of you? His image. But Caesar's image is on a coin, whereas God's image is in you. If the loss of a coin causes you to weep because you have lost Caesar's image, would not any damage brought in you to God's image be for you a cause for tears?" St. Augustine sermon 24.


Prayer for the Week

TODAY IS WORLD MISSION SUNDAY

World Mission Sunday is a day set aside for the Catholic Church throughout the world to publicly renew its commitment to the missionary movement, coordinated by the Pontifical Mission Societies, who are also known as *Missio*. It is celebrated on the penultimate (next-to-last) Sunday of October every year, October 22, 2023. It was created by Pope Pius XI in 1926 as the day of prayer for missions. Closely related to Society for the Propagation of the Faith. *Appeal envelopes are available in the gathering space*.

THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN AN ACKNOWLEDGEMENT OF COUNTRY AND A WELCOME TO COUNTRY

An **Acknowledgement of Country** is a way that all people can show awareness and respect for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander culture and heritage and the ongoing relationship the Traditional Custodians have with their Country – that is, where the event, meeting, function or conference takes place.

It can be formal or informal. **Both First Australian** and non-Indigenous people can perform Acknowledgement of Country. It should occur at the beginning of an event.

Acknowledgement of Country is also commonly written at the beginning of public documents.

Protocols for welcoming visitors to Country have been a part of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander culture for thousands of years.

A Welcome to Country is a ceremony where Traditional Custodian Elders welcome people to their land. Its form is dependent on the officiating Elder, the location and type of event, and the practice of the local Indigenous Community. It might be a short speech or a performance of some sort, like a song, traditional dance, a didgeridoo piece or any combination of these. An Elder from different Country may sometimes perform the Welcome ceremony with permission. Welcome to Country should always occur at the opening of an event. Reference:

AUSTRALIAN CATHOLIC BISHOPS CONFERENCE

A statement from Bishop Charles Gauci Chair, Bishops Commission for Relations with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples.

After an intense and, at times, challenging debate over the proposed Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Voice, we woke this morning to the news that there will not be a change to the constitution. A majority of Australians did not see the Voice as the way to address those disparities. But that doesn't mean we shouldn't do something. It doesn't mean we accept the status quo.

Since the 1840s, Catholic leaders have spoken up about the inhumane way Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples were treated, with our first bishop commenting with horror that they were given similar consideration as livestock. While our Church's history is not without blemish, the Church has been a driver of positive change. We have done that through education, through health and aged care, in social welfare and in the life of our parishes – where First Nations Catholics are growing in number. Our challenge is to do more.

As the people of Australia receive the news of the referendum, may we recognise and take up the challenge to create opportunities but also seek outcomes that will see inequalities in our country narrowed, a path to reconciliation pursued and a more prosperous nation emerge.
