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# Looking at the Readings

We have heard Jesus warning "I tell you solemnly, tax collectors and prostitutes are making their way into the kingdom of God before you" to the chief priests, elders, scribes and Pharisees several time in various passages and over numerous occasions in private reading and public liturgy. So, the shock factor for us has been greatly diminished. But the leaders and elders of the community, hearing it for the first time, would really be shocked and so react with plots of retaliation. How dare he make the most despicable traitors and grossly immoral people not only comparable to them but precede before of them! Several elders recognised John the Baptist as a holy man. But did they recognise, acknowledge and rejoice in those persons who repented through John's baptism of conversion?

next Sunday:

Matthew includes this parable in his Gospel for the nascent church community of his day. Faults in human nature, erroneous teachings and bad practices tend to re-emerge from time to time in society and church. Also, John the Baptist, Christ, apostles and prophets, preachers and teachers, spiritual writers and proverb-smiths repeat similar warnings and the need for conversion of heart and personal integrity.

Our first response to the Gospel is "Praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ!" may our actions be our enduring response and say "Thanks be to God" for our conversion and the conversion of our brothers and sisters.

# MARIAN FESTIVAL GOES ONLINE 11<sup>th</sup> October, 2020

For the last 45 years, the Marian Festival has been celebrated every year in the Bendigo area as a special day of prayers and devotions in honour of Our Lady of Fatima.

It has taken place at different Churches in the Bendigo area over the years but, in the 1990s, became an annual event at Sacred Heart Cathedral and, in 2001, it was made an official event of the Sandhurst Diocese by Bishop Joseph Grech.

Since then, the festival has always included a procession around the Cathedral, praying of the Rosary and the crowning of the statue of Our Lady. The festival has grown in size over time and, in recent years, hundreds have come from all over the Sandhurst Diocese, as well as from Melbourne, Ballarat and Geelong.

This year, because of the lockdown restrictions, the festival will be celebrated at St Liborius' Church, Eaglehawk and streamed online so people can participate at home.

# 106TH WORLD DAY OF MIGRANTS AND REFUGEES

This year, Pope Francis' WDMR message focuses on the pastoral care of internally displaced people (IDPs), who number over 41 million worldwide.

The title of his message is 'Forced like Jesus to Flee', the essence of this year's WDMR message originates in the experience of the young Jesus and his family as displaced persons and refugees. This experience provides a specific Christological grounding for the Christian action of welcome or hospitality.

The message concludes with the following prayer.

Father, you entrusted to Saint Joseph what you held most precious: the child Jesus and his Mother, in order to protect them from the dangers and threats of the wicked.

Grant that we may experience his protection and help. May he, who shared in the sufferings of those who flee from the hatred of the powerful, console and protect all our brothers and sisters driven by war, poverty and necessity to leave their homes and their lands to set out as refugees for safer places.


Help them, through the intercession of Saint Joseph, to find the strength to persevere, give them comfort in sorrows and courage amid their trials.

Grant to those who welcome them, some of the tender love of this just and wise father, who loved Jesus as a true son and sustained Mary at every step of the way.

May he, who earned his bread by the work of his hands, watch over those who have seen everything in life taken away, and obtain for them the dignity of a job and the serenity of a home.

We ask this through Jesus Christ, your Son, whom Saint Joseph saved by fleeing to Egypt, and trusting in the intercession of the Virgin Mary, whom she loved as a faithful husband in accordance with your will.

Diocesan Disability Contact Coordinator, Mary Pianta, is excited to help Sandhurst parishes to learn from each other and other dioceses, about ways in which we can all foster the full participation of people living with disability in parish life. To do this, Mary is seeking people from each parish to act as disability contacts, so we can share our stories and work together to implement positive change.

Although delayed due to COVID restrictions, Mary still intends to gather information about current practices and facilities, including some existing initiatives which could be shared and scaled up to deanery or diocesan level; with these details informing us for parish improvements and policies to support people with disabilities and their families.

Every congregation in every parish will have similar needs but different responses. After speaking directly with parishioners with disabilities to learn of their unique needs and preferences, we can aim to make it possible for them to be involved, to feel welcome and to achieve their expectations.

As was stated last time, the Bishops' Commission still calls us to be communities "where we can use and celebrate the gifts of people living with disability". To accomplish this, it needs the willingness of interested people to act as disability contacts for their area.
